Anyway, having made the decision to cancel I decided to see if we could recoup some of the expenses we'd incurred such as airport parking etc. I presumed we'd lost the money for the flight, as it was our choice not to fly, but thought it would be right and proper to at least let EasyJet know. Well, that was easier said than done!

The flight had been booked online, so I scoured the website for where it says 'cancel flight'. It catered for every other eventuality BUT cancelling your flight (or at least letting them know we wouldn't be travelling with them). I got the dialling tone followed by some very pleasant recorded music reassuring me that I was now on hold and it would be just a matter of time before I was speaking to someone who could help me. Alas, after a couple of minutes the phone went dead and I'd obviously been cut off. Not to be outdone I tried again . . . and then again . . . after being cut off for a second time and then for a third time, I gave up!

I'm sure we've all had similar experiences when we've been told "All our operators are extremely busy at the moment, please call back again, or log onto our website . . . ", when all we want to do is just speak to a real person!!!

For some people there may be times when God can feel a bit like that hard to get hold of person, especially as we approach Christmas. Someone we're trying to contact, but who remains that little bit too elusive to get a proper conversation with. Someone whose number isn't readily available, and if we find the number, never picks up the phone when we ring (metaphorically speaking of course). Or someone we can only access via some elaborate ritual that we don't really properly understand.

In a commercialised world it is easy to lose sight of the real reason for Christmas, but this is it, it is God making himself available to us in human form, a real person.

In an occupied country, in a volatile period of history, God not only made himself available and accessible to us, but he also made himself vulnerable for us. He came amongst us as a helpless child reliant solely on his human parents, that we might see God in a human context. That we might see God in our own experiences. That we might see God in each other.

But best of all, this wasn't a 'one off' opportunity. God goes on making himself available to us though Jesus his Son.

As Christmas approaches may we all know the presence and reassurance of 'Emmanuel', 'God with us'.





This poem for Christmas written for us by Sarah Weston.

Christmas Lamb

In the deepening dark, a star haze swirled and shimmered overhead

As I leant into my mother's side, craving warmth on that cool Judean night.

A sudden flash fired the dry, stubbled field with blinding brightness, and
When thunder rolled across the quivering ground, I shrank in terror, too paralysed to resist.
Then my shepherd came and cradled me in reassuring arms.

Stroking my unblemished head, he carried me to shelter in the shrouded hillside town, And bowing low, placed me before a young mother, face radiant with reverential joy. Smiling, she made an offering in return, holding aloft her swaddled, new-born son. The babe reached out a perfect hand and touched my fleecy brow, And in that shrunken moment, where space and time collide, I felt dull fears subside, And heard the susurration of soft wheat. Bathed in the glow of risen sun I found myself in verdant grass, sprawled and peaceful, near a tranquil stream. Then, giving a contented sigh, he nestled in the depths of her devotion,

And up above, a star pierced the heavens, bright light defeating darkness.

Rev Francis Kilvert was curate in Clyro on the Welsh border, near Hay on Wye for 8 years. He kept a diary of his years there. These are two Christmas extracts

Christmas 1870

As I lay awake praying in the early morning I thought I heard distant bells. There was an intense frost. I sat down in my bath upon a sheet of thick ice which broke in the middle into large pieces whilst sharp points and jagged edged stuck all round the sides of the tub, not particularly comforting to the naked thighs and loins, for the keen ice cut like broken glass. The ice water stung and scorched like fire. I had to collect the floating pieces of ice and pile them on a chair before I could use the sponge and then I had to thaw the sponge in my hands for it was amass of ice. The morning was most brilliant. Walked to church and the road sparkled with millions of rainbows, the seven colours gleaming in every glittering point of hoar frost. The church was very cold in spite of two roaring stove fires. Mr Venables preached.

26th December

Much warmer and almost a thaw.

Christmas Day 1878

Very hard frost last night. At Presteign the thermometer fell to 2 degrees, showing 30 degrees of frost. Last night is said to have been the coldest night for 100 years. The windows of the house and church were so thick with frost rime that we could not see out. We could not see through the church windows all day. Snow lay on the ground and the day was dark and gloomy with a murky sky. A fair morning congregation considering the weather.

Immediately after dinner I had to go back to the church for the funeral of little Davie of Old Weston who died on Monday was fixed for 2.15. The weather was dreadful, the snow driving in blinding clouds and the walking tiresome. Yet the funeral was only 20 minutes late. The Welcome Home Bell, as it chimed softly and slowly to greet the little pilgrim coming to his rest, sounded bleared and muffled through the thick snowy air. The snow fell thickly all through the funeral service and at the service by the grave a kind woman offered her umbrella which a kind young man fellow came and held over my head. I asked the poor mourners to come in and rest and warm themselves but they would not and went into the church. The poor father, David Davies the shepherd, was crying bitterly for the loss of his little lamb. Owing to the funeral it was rather late before we began the afternoon service. There were very few people in church beside the mourners. The afternoon was very dark. I was obliged to move close to the great south window to read the lessons and could hardly see even then. I preached from Luke ii. 7. 'There was no room for them in the inn' and connected the little bed in the churchyard in which we laid Davie to rest with the manger cradle at Bethlehem.


Although Francis Kilvert was a curate, he had two services and a funeral on Christmas Day.



1. Eat with Season

Most of our beloved veg heroes at Christmas, including potatoes, sprouts, carrots, leeks, and parsnips, are all in season throughout the winter.

Opting for seasonal, organic food means supporting the UK's nature-friendly farmers, who grow using fewer pesticides, on British farms that support diverse wildlife and healthy, living soils



2. Cut down on festive waste

Don't let your leftovers go to waste this Christmas, there are plenty ways to use them up in tasty meals.

3. Sign up a friend for a veg. box

Imagine the sight of a box filled with beautiful veg under the tree this Christmas! When you gift a friend or family member a veg box subscription, you'll be signing them up to an amazing community of citizens, farmers and growers who are making sure the way we farm and eat is better for nature and the climate.



4. Make an informed choice about your tree

Real vs. fake – the great Christmas tree debate continues! In our view, a real tree that's been grown with care is the most sustainable choice for Christmas. If you're looking for a sustainable Christmas tree that's been grown using fewer pesticides, your best bet is a Forest Stewardship Council (FSC®) certified, or a Grown In Britain tree. These will have been responsibly managed and grown using a minimal amount of pesticides

5. Get creative with gift wrapping

It's estimated that each year in Britain, we throw away enough wrapping paper to circle the globe 9 times. If you are to use wrapping paper, make sure that the paper you use is FSC certified. And don't go for the paper without forgetting tape cannot be recycled. So try and find inventive ways that will ensure tape isn't used.



6. Support your local shops

It's never been more important to embrace our local indies! Opting to buy food from local farmers and producers in a nearby indie is a great way to show some love for the organic movement in your area this Christmas.

7. Re-think your Christmas Gifts

Going green over the festive period doesn't have to mean cutting back on gift-giving. Getting creative with your gifts and spark some joy this Christmas by enabling a loved one to get growing at home. Have you learned any new skills this year? If you have the time, consider making an up-cycled or homemade gift yourself.

Other gifts that can help lead towards a more sustainable Christmas include:

GARDENING NOTES FOR DECEMBER & JANUARY

December is the first month of winter and the 21^{st} is the day when the sun is 'way down south', seeming to appear stationary over the Tropic of Capricorn and the hours of daylight at their shortest over the Northern Hemisphere.

December is a typical winter month, but it can take on the characteristics of late autumn. Very mild weather can be experienced when south-westerly breezes flood the country with damp, moisture-laden air from the sub-tropical Atlantic. With little in the way of solar heating to the land.

Our heaviest snowfall here in the Midlands often results from a cold easterly flow clashing with milder air pushing to the south, our region then becoming 'the battlefield'. Snowfall, when deep, is a good insulator to plants that could otherwise be exposed to very low overnight temperatures.

Jobs in the garden will have to be undertaken as and when the weather allows, both time and daylight will be limited. If nothing else, try to keep the garden tidy and prepare the ground for the coming season.

If not already done it is not too late to trim <u>lightly</u> long shoots of roses to prevent 'wind rock' during the winter. However, if the weather is frosty or cold leave well alone and don't cut back too hard as this could lead to soft, sappy growth during mild spells which will only be killed by frosts. Don't compost shoots that have blackspot - <u>burn them!</u> Where soil has become compacted, or you've recently walked over it, use a spade or fork gently to chip or break up the upper layers, allowing frost action to get to work. Don't dig too deeply; this will take cold soil down deeper into the bed. Limited planting is possible where the weather allows, but only if soil conditions are favourable. Don't plant if it is frozen or waterlogged. Deciduous hedging should be planted as soon as possible.

Keep a check on forced bulbs for Christmas flowering, as they should be nearing the pint where they will need moving into a cool well-lit position. Frost can loosen the soil around recently planted shrubs and trees, so periodically check for 'lifted' plants and refirm where necessary. 'Wind rock' can also loosen plants, so check for this at the same time.

For early winter colour you can do no better than the charming cyclamen coum. Often in flower just before Christmas C.coum is very hardy and, I believe, should be established in every garden, or in small alpine trough. Flowers can be white, delicate shell pink beautiful rose or deep magenta, the glossy dark green to patterned silver and the kidney shaped foliage only adds to its charm. A carpet of C.coum around the base of a mature tree in the darkest days of winter can really lift the heart. The soil should be well drained and the site slightly shaded during the summer, remaining moist during autumn through to spring. Top dress the site with leaf mould and grit and be sparing with fertiliser. They will reward you with a truly spectacular carpet of colour. One note of caution, hardy cyclamen are generally dormant during the summer, so remember where you planted them and do not hoe them out! As seedlings appear leave them to mature, and you will see the carpet of colour increasing year by year.

It may be cold outside, the ground frozen, but the shortest day is at hand and it can only get lighter from 21^{st} onwards. The new gardening year starts soon!

Have a very Merry Christmas, and a Happy New Year and enjoy your garden.

(you didn't eat out in those days). However, on this night the Inn was full. This was Bethlehem and there was a census being held and everybody had to go to the house and line of who they belonged to. Being of the line of David, Joseph and Mary found themselves in Bethlehem where they were to register. This certainly wasn't a "Welcome Inn" because it was full up and Joseph and Mary hadn't booked. There was no room for them at the Inn, every room was taken up by those travelling for the census, so they had to find somewhere for the night. Where? Nobody knows. Nowhere in the Bible does it say Jesus was born in a stable, but He was certainly born close to that Inn. Perhaps a lean-to or a shed, not the stable. It was here Mary gave birth to her firstborn. "She wrapped Him in cloths and laid Him in a manger because there was no room for them in the Inn". (Luke2:7 NIV). While inside the inn everybody was eating, drinking or sleeping, unaware that outside History was being made. The birth of Jesus Christ, right on their doorstep, and they just missed it.

You have to remember that this was the Middle East and if we take December 25th as the day Christ was born, it would have been quite mild, certainly no snow on the ground, so sleeping in a shed or even a tent would have been no problem. Yes, it could get quite cold but you didn't need a hot water bottle and there were plenty of sheepskins if you began to feel a chill. However, if those people in the inn missed the arrival of The Messiah, others didn't.

Out in the fields above Bethlehem were shepherds watching over their flocks at night. Probably sitting around their fire, having a meal. Shepherd's pie? Who knows? Then an Angel of the Lord appeared to them and they were scared. These simple people were the first to know of the birth of Jesus. How wonderful is that? So they hurried off down to Bethlehem and found Mary and Joseph and the baby, who was lying in a manger. "When they had seen Him, they spread the Word and everybody was amazed at what the shepherds told them about Baby Jesus". The word of the shepherds would eventually spread all over the world. It is remarkable that all through His life shepherds and sheep would be a part; the Good Shepherd and His flock.

Whether the customers of that inn on that Christmas eve ever knew what took place on that night we'll never know. But let's face it, they just missed it, we didn't.

Became a child on earth for me?


No love that in a family dwells

And lives today in bread and wine."



The man who married Mary

The traditional Nativity scene on our Christmas cards has Mary with the Holy Babe. Around her are the shepherds and Magi. We may also see stable animals, angels and a star! While Joseph is often included, his presence seems to be of minor importance.

After all, we praise God for Jesus with our familiar Christmas carols, mentioning angels, shepherds, Wise Men and Mary but the name of Joseph is absent! Why is Joseph given a low profile? For he is a man to be remembered.

Joseph was a resident of Nazareth. He worked as a carpenter and his skills would have included making furniture, repairing buildings and crafting agricultural tools. Although Joseph had an honourable profession, he would not have been a man of great wealth.

The gospel writers Matthew and Luke give Joseph a few brief mentions. After the birth of Jesus, Joseph and Mary go to the temple in Jerusalem to dedicate the Baby to God. Afterwards, they flee into Egypt to escape the wrath of Herod and much later return to Nazareth. 12 years later, Mary and Joseph go with Jesus to Jerusalem for the Passover feast. Here they lose Jesus, only to find Him in the Temple talking with religious leaders!

Apart from these verses, the New Testament is silent about the rest of Joseph's life. However, we do know that Joseph was father to other children by Mary. His four sons are named, and they had at least two daughters. (See Matthew 13:55)

And we also know that Joseph was someone who quietly and humbly took on the awesome role in caring for the early life of the Son of God. Joseph would have taught Jesus many things – not just the skills of a labourer, but the lore of the countryside which was evident in our Lord's teaching. Jesus grew up within a loving family and described God as 'Father', knowing also the good fatherly qualities of Joseph.

In the Christmas story, Joseph is placed into a situation that brought him misunderstanding and suspicion. But Joseph remained faithful in the knowledge that as long as God had spoken, the opinion of others mattered little. Before Jesus began His ministry, it is believed that Joseph died. It is likely Jesus took on many of His father's responsibilities before He left home.

In the eyes of the world, Joseph was a nobody. He was not a man of valour, fame and fortune. But he was the one who had parental responsibility for the greatest person who has ever lived! It is sad that we often equate ordinariness with ineffectiveness. Down the ages, God has used many ordinary people to accomplish great things. God continues to use ordinary people. Like Joseph, we need to know that doing God's will is the most important thing in life. May we, this Christmas, respond to God's call to us and please Him in all that we do.





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
