

Dear Friends,

I suppose, like me, you will have heard the latest census results report that Christian religious belief among the population in Britain has fallen again.

It has fallen from 2001 when 71.7% (37.3 million) described themselves as Christian, to 59.3% of the population in 2011 and now in 2021 46.2% (27.5 million). According to the Office of National Statistics, who carried out the survey, over the last ten years the Muslim, Hindu, Sikh & Buddhist faiths have increased very slightly, with the Jewish faith staying the same. It is those in the group who claim 'No Religion' that has grown significantly.

There are of course various theories as to why this should be, such as age and generational shifts. Professor Abby Day from the University of London says "Baby boomers lost their religion in the 1960's and raised their millennial children to be non-religious". There are also calls from the Humanists and the National Secular Society for such things as reform of the Anglican establishment, daily prayers in parliament and in schools, suggesting they are outdated and fail to reflect the country we live in. That's as maybe, but I don't think any of this comes as a surprise to anyone who goes to church. It is plain to see, especially at this time of year, how Christian religious festivals such as Christmas have become secularised.

I know it doesn't just apply to this time of year, the same applies to Easter. Every year since the Churches Together in Kidderminster Easter Trail in Brinton's Park was started some of the councillors involved have tried to remove the religious aspect of it, which to you and I seems crazy, but is the annual reality. Therefore, and I know this is a familiar mantra, amidst the tinsel and fairy lights it really is important to keep 'Christ' in 'Christ'mas!

Falling numbers, whether that be in the countrywide ten-yearly census, or in a small local church, always feels like failure. We tend to be programmed to view success in terms of numbers, the bigger the number the greater the success and Church is no different. But the Church isn't called to be successful, the Church is called to be faithful. We're called to be faithful!

However we decide to celebrate Christmas this year and I'm mindful that for some it will be a time of great expense, not least of all because of increased energy bills and the like, and for others across the world there will be other hardships to endure. We should remember the birth that gave us that first Christmas was a birth of uncertainty, of discomfort, of poverty, of risk, but most of all a birth of faithfulness.

As another Christmas approaches, as festive lights appear on trees, as cards fall onto doorsteps in greater number, as the razzmatazz of Christmas gets truly underway, may we all grow in faithfulness and know the faithfulness of God for ourselves in the form of the Christ child. 'Emmanuel', 'God with us'.



### **BAXTER MINISTER'S LETTER**

### God with us...

Dear Friends,

Writing a Christmas message is a real challenge because what can you say that is new? After all the most important moment in history – the birth of our saviour Jesus – really can speak for itself without me trying to put a spin on it.

Christmas is such an awe inspiring moment though isn't it? It's the moment that God takes on flesh and 'moves into our neighbourhood' and means that no matter what we may be facing in our lives we can be reassured that God knows how we feel and can respond to us in all our need. And perhaps that's the most important part of the Christmas message for us this year.

The past few months have been fairly depressing in terms of what we have witnessed on the news. The cost of living crisis is affecting millions of people up and down the country and as I write these words people are worried about how they are going to make ends meet, are accessing foodbanks, receiving debt support etc. Added to this the threat of war hangs over us and although the war in Ukraine doesn't affect us directly, all of us feel its effects with the costs of energy and fuel spiralling out of control. And on top of that we see the worst effects of climate change as many parts of the world are becoming more and more uninhabitable and we are seeing people making very risky and perilous journeys to seek refuge in countries all over Western Europe.

In the face of such pain and misery it probably leads many of us to question where is God in all this? Does God even care for us? Well let's go back to the start of this letter and remind ourselves what Advent and Christmas are all about. This is when God makes his dwelling amongst us. This is the moment when God shows he cares. And this is the moment when the ways of the world are turned on their head.

The prophet Isaiah got it right when he declared to us "that a child is born, a son is given, and the government will be upon his shoulders. He will be called Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of peace" and his "kingdom will have no end".

This is what Advent and Christmas are about. They declare there is a different way to live our lives. There is hope and good news for a better future. And it begins now.

Each of us carries this message of hope within our call to discipleship. Each of us is tasked with telling this good news to others. So this Advent and Christmas as we prepare to celebrate the birth of our Lord and Saviour let's commit ourselves to declaring this truth and let's seek to birth God's kingdom into our church families and our community as we declare with one voice — Emmanuel, God is with us.

### GARDENING NOTES FOR DECEMBER & JANUARY

December is the first month of winter and the 21st is the day when the sun is 'way down south', seeming to appear stationary over the Tropic of Capricorn and the hours of daylight at their shortest over the Northern Hemisphere.

December is a typical winter month, but it can take on the characteristics of late autumn. Very mild weather can be experienced when south-westerly breezes flood the country with damp, moisture-laden air from the sub-tropical Atlantic. With little in the way of solar heating to the land.

Our heaviest snowfall here in the Midlands often results from a cold easterly flow clashing with milder air pushing to the south, our region then becoming 'the battlefield'. Snowfall, when deep, is a good insulator to plants that could otherwise be exposed to very low overnight temperatures.

Jobs in the garden will have to be undertaken as and when the weather allows, both time and daylight will be limited. If nothing else, try to keep the garden tidy and prepare the ground for the coming season.

If not already done it is not too late to trim <u>lightly</u> long shoots of roses to prevent 'wind rock' during the winter. However, if the weather is frosty or cold leave well alone and don't cut back too hard as this could lead to soft, sappy growth during mild spells which will only be killed by frosts. Don't compost shoots that have blackspot - <u>burn them!</u> Where soil has become compacted, or you've recently walked over it, use a spade or fork gently to chip or break up the upper layers, allowing frost action to get to work. Don't dig too deeply; this will take cold soil down deeper into the bed. Limited planting is possible where the weather allows, but only if soil conditions are favourable. Don't plant if it is frozen or waterlogged. Deciduous hedging should be planted as soon as possible.

Keep a check on forced bulbs for Christmas flowering, as they should be nearing the pint where they will need moving into a cool well-lit position. Frost can loosen the soil around recently planted shrubs and trees, so periodically check for 'lifted' plants and refirm where necessary. 'Wind rock' can also loosen plants, so check for this at the same time.

For early winter colour you can do no better than the charming cyclamen coum. Often in flower just before Christmas C.coum is very hardy and, I believe, should be established in every garden, or in small alpine trough. Flowers can be white, delicate shell pink beautiful rose or deep magenta, the glossy dark green to patterned silver and the kidney shaped foliage only adds to its charm. A carpet of C.coum around the base of a mature tree in the darkest days of winter can really lift the heart. The soil should be well drained and the site slightly shaded during the summer, remaining moist during autumn through to spring. Top dress the site with leaf mould and grit and be sparing with fertiliser. They will reward you with a truly spectacular carpet of colour. One note of caution, hardy cyclamen are generally dormant during the summer, so remember where you planted them and do not hoe them out! As seedlings appear leave them to mature, and you will see the carpet of colour increasing year by year.

It may be cold outside, the ground frozen, but the shortest day is at hand and it can only get lighter from  $21^{st}$  onwards. The new gardening year starts soon!

### This is our Once-a-Year Day

'Well here it is Merry Christmas' screams Noddy Holder from Slade. Wall to wall music in ships and bars; thankfully no piped music in church, that's what they call Sanctuary. For us it's Carols, every one beautiful; why can't we have 'Away in a manger' in July? I wouldn't complain. Some of these carols are very old, some are modern but one thing stands out, they're the only songs in "Singing the Faith" that we know the words to. Though some lyrics are crazy, "Little Lord Jesus no crying He makes". We know Jesus was special, but a baby that doesn't cry?! Forget that, Carols are wonderful and moving in a simple way.

Christmas of course isn't mentioned in The Bible. St. Nicholas is given the credit for being the basis for Father Christmas, well noted for his generosity and kindness, he emerged in Victorian Times as a happy bearded man. It was an American, the Rev. Clement C. Moore, a New York Episcopal minister who made Santa Claus, he wrote "T'was the night before Christmas". He had a man who travelled by sleigh pulled by reindeer with a sack of toys on his back. He entered houses by going down chimneys and filling children's stockings with toys and sweets. How did we find out that Father Christmas wore red? That was from a Coca-Cola advertising campaign in 1931. Just think, on Christmas Eve he travels 221 million miles at an average speed of 1279 miles a second, 6,395 times the speed of sound. Thank heavens he doesn't need petrol. But this is the commercial side of Christmas – what does it really mean to us? It really is a special day.

The main point of Christmas is simply Jesus Christ and at Christmas we celebrate the birthday of the most famous man who has ever lived. Famous, you say? How come we called whatever happened before He was born BC and what happened after AD? The fact is that how we celebrate Christmas has simply destroyed the main vision of Jesus Christ. We eat, drink and be merry, we give presents, but the wise men were right, there should be gifts, but nothing less that gold for the infant Jesus. He was born to die for us, take Mark 10 v. 4,5 "For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give His life as a ransom for many" (NIV). So that's what Christmas is all about. Jesus never asked us to remember His birth, He wanted us to remember His death. Christmas would have meant nothing to Jesus. It was through His death we would find eternal life and, believing this, we will be saved. Now a puzzle, not Where's Wally? But Where's Joseph? OK, he's only a surrogate father but he saved baby Jesus's life by taking Him away to Egypt. As a carpenter he was by Jesus's side most of his life. Surely, apart from God, he had the most influence on His life and early years. In fact, his hand rocked Jesus's cradle. You see a painting or artefact, it's Madonna and child, virgin and child or adoration of the magi. One whole room in the National Gallery is devoted to Leonardo da Vinci's 'Virgin and Child', but no Joseph. The Christmas story is wonderful, the baby became The Messiah so remember Joseph in your prayers this Yuletide.

This story, of course, begins in Genesis and as we move through the Old Testament there are many clues to Him who was to come later. Let us make this year a celebration of the chance to receive Him and believe in Him. This is our once-a-year day, not just a day for people to be nice to one another. Over 2000 years of Christ's birth become real to us. As Tiny Tim said in 'A Christmas Carol' "God bless us every one!"

However, the last work has to go to the late Poet Laureate and historian John Betjeman:

"And is it true, and is it true
This most tremendous tale of all
Seen in a stained-glass window's hue
A baby in an ox's stall?
The maker of the stars and sea
Became a child on Earth for me?"

No love that in a family dwells No carolling in frosty air Nor all the steeple-shaking bells Can with this single truth compare That God was man in Pelestine And lives today in bread and wine.

### Donkey


### THE DAY AFTER THE DAY AFTER BOXING DAY

### First sermon in British Sign Language at St Paul's Cathedral

A Baptist minister, the Revd Sue Whalley, has recently delivered the first ever known sermon in British Sign Language (BSL) at St Paul's Cathedral.

The invitation grew out of a meeting in London between Deaf Church Leaders and Church of England Clergy. Building on the momentum of the BSL Act last April (when British Sign Language was accepted as an official language in England and Wales), it was suggested that a Deaf person preach at St Paul's Cathedral.

A maximum of 30 Deaf people were expected to attend alongside the hearing visitors to the cathedral. But instead, 60- 70 Deaf people turned up, "highlighting the importance and significance of the event."

### All in the month of DECEMBER

It was:

200 years ago, on 27<sup>th</sup> December 1822 that Louis Pasteur, French biologist, microbiologist, and chemist was born. One of the fathers of germ theory, he was best known for the pasteurisation process, which is named in his honour.

100 years ago, on 14<sup>th</sup> December 1922 that John Reith (later Lord Reith) was appointed as General Manager of the BBC. 90 years ago, on 25<sup>th</sup> December 1932 that the first Royal Christmas Message was broadcast on radio. King George V addressed the nation live from Sandringham.

80 years ago, on 1<sup>st</sup> December 1942 that the British Government published the Beveridge Report, which formed the basis of the welfare state.

65 years ago, on 25<sup>th</sup> December 1957 that Queen Elizabeth II's Christmas message was televised for the first time.

50 years ago, on 22<sup>nd</sup> December 1972 that 14 people were found alive in the Andes more than two months after their plane crashed. They had survived by eating dead passengers.

40 years ago, on 12<sup>th</sup> December 1982 that 30,000 women joined hands around the Greenham Common RAF base in Berkshire to protest against the siting of US Cruise missiles there.

25 years ago, on 11<sup>th</sup> December 1997 that the Kyoto Protocol, aimed at reducing greenhouse gases and combating global warming, was adopted at a conference in Japan. More than 190 countries have signed the agreement, which came into effect in February 2005.

10 years ago, on 9<sup>th</sup> December 2012 that Patrick Moore, British astronomer, television presenter and musician died. Best known for hosting the astronomy series The Sky at Night (1957-2013) the longest-running TV series with the same presenter.

The mysterious ways of mistletoe

Mistletoe has long been used as part of our Christmas decorations. It is not your usual kind of plant.

Instead, it is *hemiparasitic*, meaning that although its leaves enable it to feed itself through photosynthesis, its roots invade the host tree or shrub to extract water and other nutrients. Mistletoe loves living in apple, lime, hawthorn, poplar or oak trees. You may spot it high up, as a large globe, on the bare trees in winter. There is one spectacular example in Windsor Great Park, clearly visible from the path on the opposite side of the Thames.

Mistletoe's berries are almost translucent, fleshy and sticky. They form in the forks of mistletoe's many branches. While they are toxic to humans, they are attractive to birds, who wipe the remaining seeds off their beaks onto the nearest branch, which of course helps the plant to spread.

For some reason, Romans thought mistletoe represented Peace, Love and Understanding. Perhaps that is how it got into our Christmas celebrations? The earliest documentary evidence for kissing under mistletoe dates from the 16<sup>th</sup> century, but we don't know who got kissed first.


