

Crowned by the Holy Spirit...

Dear Friends,

This year marks the 70th year of the Queens reign and as a nation we are celebrating her Platinum Jubilee.

As it so happens the celebrations fall the same weekend that as churches we celebrate Pentecost – the coming of the Holy Spirit and the birth of the church. As we know this was the moment when, through the power of the Holy Spirit, the disciples were propelled from the safety of the upper room out into the streets of Jerusalem to tell anyone who would listen to them the good news of Jesus. We also know they never looked back and went on from there to take the message of the good news into all the world.

The disciples were not self-conscious or afraid. They didn't feel unworthy or inadequate to carry the message of faith with them. They just knew that Jesus was God's anointed, God's Son and that everyone the world over needed to know the truth that God in Jesus had rescued them from all the wrong things they had done and could begin again.

When I was thinking about the Platinum Jubilee celebrations and our celebrations as churches for Pentecost, I started wondering if there were any similarities between the coronation of our Queen and the coming of the Holy Spirit on the disciples. For those of you who will be in church on Pentecost Sunday you will hear this more fully but I started to wonder whether the coming of Holy Spirit is a coronation-type event.

We all know that with a coronation comes a lot of pageantry. Although I wasn't there at the time of our Queen's coronation (I know most of you were and it was probably the first televised event you witnessed) I can imagine what the event and the atmosphere was like. The Queen arrived at Westminster Abbey to be crowned to a fanfare of trumpets announcing her arrival so that the crowds that had gathered knew the moment had come. In the same way when the Holy Spirit came on the disciples, her arrival (the Holy Spirit in the bible is always described in feminine terms) was announced with a sound from heaven that sounded like a strong wind blowing. It may or may not have been heavenly music played like a fanfare of trumpets but the sound filled the whole and caused a crowd to gather outside.

Then at the coronation of our Queen, Elizabeth was anointed with holy oil and the crown was placed on her head. In the same way the disciples were crowned with the Holy Spirit as each person's head was touched with what looked like tongues of fire and each disciple was anointed by the Holy Spirit as each person there started to speak in other tongues.

Finally, at the coronation the newly crowned Queen was announced to the public and in a well-known and loved ceremony our Queen was presented to her people on the balcony at Buckingham Palace. In the same way the disciples were presented to the community of Jerusalem as the disciples were propelled out into the streets to meet the crowds.

Both days were days to remember and since then both events have been talked about. Everyone knows what they were doing on the day of the coronation and in the case of the disciples the message they carried has continued to influence and encourage people the world over for the past 2,000 years.

And this Pentecost the gift of the Holy Spirit is offered to each of us once more. Each of us can remember the moment that we accepted Jesus into our hearts and chose to accept him as Lord and Saviour, and we can probably remember moments in our lives where the Holy Spirit has come and filled our hearts and minds with the knowledge and wonder of God. Each of us has done things for the good news of Jesus because of the strength we have received from God. Each of us has been crowned.

So let's this Pentecost live in the power of the Holy Spirit and let's shake off our fears, and live with hope and the promise of new life.





GARDENING NOTES FOR JUNE

June can be a month of contrasts, often beginning dry, sunny and very warm to locally hot, the mid-month period however unseasonably cool and unsettled, 'The European Monsoon' setting in around the second week.

The sun will be at its most powerful during this month, the summer solstice taking place around the 21st when the sun will be directly over the 'Tropic of Cancer'. The clear blue skies and warmth of an early summer anticyclone are something to savour, before the humidity associated with later in the season arrives.

Early June is favourable for a spell of fine and settled weather, usually the result of an extension of the Azores High which has a tendency to take up a more northerly position in Mid-Atlantic. An 'unseasonably' cool and unsettled spell during mid-June onwards is often referred to as the 'European Monsoon'. Atlantic low pressure systems and their associated bands of rain and showers seem to power their way across the UK in an almost never ending stream. Fortunately June on the whole is characterised by a mix of both fine, settled, sometimes hot, weather and refreshing cooler showery conditions; 'all good growing weather' as they say!

If the weather conditions are forecast to be dry for any length of time, then keep in mind that prolonged draught is bad news for the lawn. Whilst I am no advocate of irrigating a lawn during dry weather, it is better to take preventative measures now whilst the soil and lawn is still moist. Spiking the lawn after rain when the soil is moist will have great benefit, allowing subsequent rainfall to penetrate deeper into the soil. Also remember to raise the mower blades slightly so as not to cut too short; mowing little and often is key to keeping the lawn in check.

There are a number of plants which can be pruned once they have finished flowering, these include: Clematis Montana, Privet, Chaenomeles, Choisya, Berberis and ribes.

June is an ideal time to give a light feed to herbaceous plants, either a liquid manure or general fertilizer such as Rooster.

Deadhead early flowering subjects such as lupins; this should ensure you are treated to another flush of flowers later in the season. *Delphiniums* will require staking to prevent wind damage when in full flower. Roses will be in full bloom now and will need regular checking for aphid or fungal attack. Spray as

required with appropriate systemic insecticide or fungicide.

Weeds will be 'on the rampage'. An hour spent weeding now will pay dividends later in the season, remember the old saying "one year's weeds is seven year's weeds". Regular hoeing and hand weeding is the best method to deal with annual weeds. Hoe as soon as the weeds are surfacing. Ideally hoe or weed in drier weather, as any weeds left on the surface have a lesser chance to re-grow. Perennial weeds are best dug out completely as chemical control is often difficult or not practicable. Most perennial weeds are 'creepers' and will re-grow from the smallest piece of root fragment; regular removal will eventually weaken the weed. Weed growth can also be suppressed by the addition of a mulch of bark chippings, coco shell or well-rotted compost.

Plant out hardy fuchsias and put bedding plants and hanging baskets into position.

With the garden full of soft lush growth, slugs will be a major problem for most of us. Slugs attack a wide range of plants from ornamentals, vegetables and seedlings. Damage is especially noticeable when the weather is moist, the tender young growth damaged or completely eaten away, primarily during spring or early summer. Slugs are particularly active during warm, damp weather and come in a variety of sizes and colours ranging from black, brown and yellow-grey! Control of these 'little devils' is not easy, as we know, although there are preventative measures which can be taken. Good housekeeping will help; no move garden debris, leaves, unused pots and any hiding holes where they may be lurking. Encourage predators into your garden; hedgehogs, frogs, toads and birds will all help control the slug population. Copper tapes, moisture-absorbing granules, jam jars full of beer, scooped out half-oranges, grapefruits and melon skins have all been put forward as methods of slug control, with variable results. Slug pellets are useful and perfectly safe when used as directed, a liquid slug control is available, both based around methaldehyde. There is a non-chemical control available in the form of a nematode or eelworm which enters the slug's body and infects it with a bacteria leading to its death. Applied in solution, this appears to be particularly effective on well-drained soils when conditions are moist and the soil temperatures are around 60f.

Watering is of prime importance this month; tubs, hanging baskets and containers will dry out rapidly in hot weather. <u>Don't</u> water 'little and often' as this tends to encourage surface rooting leading to rapid dehydration in hot weather. A thorough soaking twice a week would be of greater benefit.

Blanket week may become a problem in garden ponds from now on; remove it as soon as possible. This applies to floating weeds such as duckweed as well; both can be composted.

Let's hope the sun shines. "What ever you are doing, enjoy your garden; it's the only one you've got"!

Waterways

Just below Trinity and in the shadow of St. Mary's Church lies one of the most picturesque views of Kidderminster, of course, it's the canal basin. Originally the canal was to make its way to Bewdley but they didn't want that "stinking ditch" so it was diverted to Stourport. Not a bad idea for Telford, a straight, flat run to Stourport, better that drilling a 1000 metre tunnel from Park Butts through to Catchems End, Bewdley! (I joke). The canals, of course, are part of history, a vital part of the Industrial Revolution, especially in the Black Country and The Midlands. Those days are gone. Today the canals are looked at as a pleasure boat ride for holidaymakers, however, the reality is quite different. In fact, the canals provide homes for thousands of people and it's a hard knock life.

You can rent a long-term mooring in a marina or alongside a canal or river where allowed. Or simply you have a cruising licence, where you move on after 14 days. Sadly, you don't get a postcode and this can discriminate against boaters. No postcode and you can't register with a GP, open a bank account, vote in local elections and you would have trouble in getting a passport or taxing a vehicle. As I said, it's a hard knock life. Things on the water are exactly the same as those on land. People become sick, suffer bereavements and marriages break down, and these lead to a loss of income. This is where waterways Chaplains come into play.

They visit the waterways on a regular basis offering friendship and a listening ear. Boating communities are good at caring for each other. They look out for each other, provide meals and help in times of trouble. Though sometimes it's nice to have someone to talk to, Chaplains have a place in providing pastoral support and care. They support people of all faiths.

Could you be a waterways chaplain? Sadly, I can't. I get dizzy walking over Bewdley bridge!

Pentecost - not a Ghost but a Gift

We used to call it Whitsun – 'White Sunday' because long ago children marched to church in white on that day. No processions nowadays, and we've even changed its name. It's now 'Pentecost', which is more accurate but needs explaining.

Pentecost marks a vital event in Christian history. It is celebrated 50 days after Easter. The year Jesus was crucified (which took place at the Passover), the remnant of His followers, just 120 of them, were together in an upper room in Jerusalem. They were afraid to show their faces in case the authorities arrested them. But on the day of Passover, they had an amazing collective experience.

They described it in terms of wind and fire, a great surge of spiritual energy and confidence. Afraid no longer, they burst out on to the streets where crowds were gathering for the festival, led by Peter they began to tell them about Jesus and His resurrection. As they did so, although many of the people in the crowd were foreigners who spoke other languages, everyone heard them in their own tongue. Peter told them that what they were seeing was the fulfilment of an old prophecy when God would pour out His Spirit on the human race, men and women, young and old.

As a result of His words and the extraordinary spectacle, 3,000 people believed and were baptised in the name of Jesus. They were the nucleus of what in 100 years would be a Church that would turn history upside down. For Christians Pentecost is in effect the birthday of the Church.

Many people find the whole idea of the Holy Spirit mysterious and elusive. It wasn't helped by the earlier title 'Holy Ghost'. The spirit is not spiritually a 'ghost' but a precious gift.

The Queen's Platinum Jubilee

This month we celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. She is the longest reigning monarch in British history. Up until recently she attended church every week and still did a full week's work at the age of 96!

It is her commitment to serving God and the nation which stands out in her life. Even before she became Queen, she made a promise, which she has kept for over 75 years: 'I declare before you all that my whole life, whether it be long or short, shall be devoted to your service' (21st birthday broadcast, 21 April 1947).

What is the secret of the Queen's consistency of character and service? In 2002 she said this: "I know just how much I rely on my faith to guide me through the good times and the bad. Each day is a new beginning. I know that the only way to live my life is to try to do what is right, to take the long view, to give of my best in all that the day brings, and to put my trust in God." These are wise words from somebody who draws her strength from the Christian Faith and can inspire all of us who want to make our lives count!

The Queen has been an example of joyful, wise, and generous service on behalf of others all her life. Six months before her coronation she asked the nation and Commonwealth to "pray that God may give me wisdom and strength to carry out the solemn promises I shall be making, and that I may faithfully serve Him and you, all the days of my life." Paul urges us to

pray for all in authority, "that we may live peaceful and quiet lives in all godliness and holiness." (1 Timothy 2:2).



What 6000 steps a day can do for you

A recent study has found that doing 6000 steps a day can reduce your risk of an early death, if you are aged over 60. People *under* the age of 60 should aim for between 8000 and 10,000 steps a day.

However, taking more than 8000 steps a day has no particular benefit, and the oft-repeated mantra that everyone should take 10,000 step a day has no grounding whatever in science. (The 10,000 steps idea came from a 1964 Japanese marketing drive to sell pedometers!)

Researchers from the University of Massachusetts Amherst point out that: "Steps are very simple to track, and there is a rapid growth of fitness-tracking devices."

The major thing to remember is that there is a "lot of evidence suggesting that moving, even a little more, is beneficial, particularly for those who are doing very little activity."

Are you a Velcro person or a Teflon person?

How much daily stress do you allow to stick to you? When it comes to coping with stress, David Almeida, a professor of human development at Pennsylvania State University, says that people can be divided into two categories.

'Velcro' people allow the stressful moment to stay with them, leaving them irritable and frustrated. 'Teflon' people see the moment of stress for what it is, but then let it slide away from them, leaving no effect on their mood.

In a ten-year study, Almeida found that people who become easily upset in the moment and who then dwell on their negative feelings and resentment are much more likely to suffer subsequent health problems such as pain, arthritis, cardiovascular complications, and mental health issues.

Major world religions - some figures

Not everyone agrees that religion is declining! Once a year the World Christian Database (WCD) issues an article (in the *International Bulletin of Mission Research*) showing the latest global figures on religion.

The latest issue shows that the number of Christian adherents worldwide in 2022 has increased to some 2.56 billion people in total, 32.2% of the global population of 7.95 billion.

However, Muslims are increasing faster, numbering in 2022 some 1.96 billion people, 24.7% of the world's population. Hindus in 2022 totalled 1.07 billion or 13.5% of the world's people.

Christian + Muslim + Hindu adherents are together 70% of the world's population in 2022.

Also 40 years ago, on 21st June 1982 that Prince William of Wales was born. Son of Charles and Diana, he is second-in-line to the British throne.

25 years ago, on 12th June 1997 that Shakespeare's Globe Theatre opened in London. It is a reconstruction of the original theatre of 1599.

Also 25 years ago, on 26th June 1997 that J K Rowling's first Harry Potter novel, *Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone* was published in the UK. Also 15 years ago, on 29th June 2007, that Apple released the first iPhone.

10 years ago, on 19th June 2012 that the founder of Wikileaks, Julian Assange, sought political asylum in the Ecuadorian Embassy in London, to avoid extradition to the USA after publishing classified documents. He remained in the embassy for seven years, until he was arrested and imprisoned.

Also 10 years ago, on 24th June 2012, that Lonesome George, the male Pinta Island tortoise died. The last-known member of his species, Lonesome George serves as an important symbol for conservation efforts around the world, and particularly in the Galapagos Islands.


