Dear Friends,

As you will be aware, when I compose the Minister's Letter for Tidings I often try to include something that is suitably topical or something relevant to the Church calendar and this month's Tidings will appear as we once again begin the season of Lent. However, I believe it would be wrong of me to ignore the situation that is happening in the Ukraine right now.

I think you would have to have been living on Mars or somewhere far away not to know that Putin's Russian Forces have invaded the peaceful and sovereign country of Ukraine and is currently fighting its way across that country to try and overcome the Ukrainian people and force them into submission. On the whole, certainly in the west, other countries have condemned the action of Putin and his government and stand in solidarity with the people of Ukraine, with governments and organisations sanctioning and boycotting Russia in areas such as banking and sport etc.

A couple of weeks ago the lectionary reading was Luke Ch 6 Vs 27-38, which speaks about Jesus' instruction to his disciples (i.e. us) to love our enemies, to pray for those who abuse us, to turn the other cheek etc. However, in the face of what we see happening in Ukraine it just amplifies how difficult this instruction from Jesus is and how hard it is for us follow.

In our feeling of helplessness for Ukraine, whilst I'm sure practical ways to help the situation will become apparent in due course, perhaps all we can do for the time being is turn to prayer. Therefore I offer this prayer below which has been put together for our use by the Joint Public Issues Team of the United Reformed Church, the Methodist Church and the Baptist Union.

God of all. with alarm and concern we bring before you the military intervention in Ukraine. In a world you made for peace and flourishing, we lament the use of armed force. We mourn every casualty of this conflict, every precious life extinguished by war. We pray comfort for those who grieve and those who are fearful. Hear our longing that leaders and nations will honour the worth of all people by having the courage to resolve conflict through dialogue. May all our human failings be transformed by your wonderful grace and goodness. We ask this in the name of Christ, the author of peace and sustainer of Creation. Amen.



Don't you want to be healed?

Dear Friends,

The past month has felt very strange with only one opportunity to see you in person for worship. But it has been good to catch up with you at other times and I know that you have been in good hands in worship through the leadership of Janet, David and Brenda.

We are now entering the season of Lent where we have the opportunity to take stock and reflect on our relationships with God. I hope during this season that we'll be able to meet and reflect on the amazing gift of God's love discovered in Jesus by using the TV series The Chosen to help us. If you haven't had the opportunity to watch an episode or two yet I really encourage you to do so as it is amazing and brings Jesus to life in a way that I think is needed more than ever in these challenging days we're living through as both a church and in the world.

I've even started using the daily devotions that link directly to The Chosen and the one I read today was particularly relevant I felt for us as a church. It picks up the story of the paralysed man who had been paralysed for 38 years and had been waiting at the pool of Siloam for many years to be healed. When Jesus meets with him he asks a very strange question of him "Don't you want to be healed?". It sounds such a stupid question doesn't it? Of course the man wanted to be healed didn't he? Well the reality is that as we read the story of the encounter the man has with Jesus, we realise that he has been there so long that he's got used to being disappointed. The spark of hope has gone from him and even when the waters of the pool get stirred up he barely registers the opportunity to try and get healed (in the first century sacred waters were associated with healing).

So when Jesus meets with the man, he's feeling fairly jaded and accepting of his situation. But Jesus' question is about challenging this situation. It's about not settling for second best i.e. to be at a place of healing but not receiving it, but claiming it for yourself and being Chosen and changed by Jesus as a result.

The same can and should be the case for us as disciples and as a church who want to walk the way of Jesus each day of our lives. We've come to settle for second best as a community of believers accepting that because the church is tight on resources we can't do anything about sharing the good news of Jesus. We've started to accept that we're a declining community and that no one will want to join us. And we've started to do nothing about any of the decisions that we've taken as a church family to set us on a new course as community.

Yes we might still be lamenting the loss of our own building and yes we might still need to prayerfully think through where we are and why we're doing what we are. But if we believe that God hasn't finished with us and has a plan for our church family we need to start doing something about it. Jesus says to us "Don't you want to be healed?"

Let's commit this Lent to prayerfully considering our future as a church family and let's celebrate together all that God has enabled us to achieve up until this point. And let's seek to meet Jesus and encourage each other in our daily walk of discipleship. And rather than settling for second best and saying "this isn't for me" let's meet and let's reflect on the Jesus who calls us into relationship with God as we share the TV series The Chosen together.

GARDENING NOTES FOR MARCH

March can be a month of contrasts, in terms of temperature and precipitation, snow and sleet is still probable, especially over high ground, and frosts can be severe. The sun's increasing strength is apparent though, and given a south-westerly breeze coupled with broken cloud, bright sunshine can send the thermometer well up.

March's watchword is to make the most of any prolonged spell of fine dry weather to work outside, but don't be lulled into a false sense of security and believe winter's over. Remember the old weather lore, "in like a lion, out like lamb"? Well it could be the other way round, so take heed.

With higher temperatures, especially at night, March is usually the time when we notice that the grass is beginning to grow once more. Established lawns can be given a light raking over. This will aid the removal of debris, dead grass and scatters any worm casts that may be appearing. With accelerated growth, lawns may require a light cut, but do ensure that the mower is on its highest setting for a short trim. Do also ensure that if the mower has been in storage over the winter months it's in full working order and it's safe.

One of the first topics we covered in these jottings was the pruning of roses, which should be done during this month if possible. Hybrid teas should have all dead, damaged or diseased wood cut out completely. Twiggy or weak shoots should be cut back to the main stem. Strong healthy stems should be pruned back by about one third; however, traditionally one stem is cut back to about 6 inches to encourage basal shoots. Floribundas too should have dead or damaged shoots cut out completely and weak side shoots cut back to the stem. Previous year's green growth should be thinned out by about one third by cutting them out completely to ground level. Remaining older brown wood should be cut back about a half, one stem trimmed down to 6 inches.

Recently planted climbers shouldn't be pruned, save for the removal of dead wood. Established climbers should have older and thicker side shoots trimmed by about one half. Refer to a specialist rose book for detailed pruning techniques as pruning at the wrong time or in an incorrect manner can wreak havoc for the season's flowering!

March is the traditional time for starting off begonia corms. To encourage good root formation you can gently press the corm, (hollow depression uppermost) into a shallow tray of compost so that the rim of the corm is just level with the compost. Keep them on the cool side, and well lit and they will soon develop roots. After several weeks you can pot up into individual pots to grow on.

Although there are many lovely early spring plants, one of the most charming must be pulsatilla vulgaris (the pasque flower). Pulsatilla vulgaris thrives in a sunny spot with a free-draining soil that is slightly limey. If your soil is a little too heavy, then adding grit will improve drainage. The pasque flower is very distinctive. Delicate bell-shaped flowers appear from early spring, usually white, pinkish-red or deep purple in colour, all with central golden stamens. To prolong flowering, dead-head regularly. Although named varieties won't come true from any seed you collect, do leave some of the 'fluffy' seed heads to develop on the plant, as they are as distinctive as the flowers. As soon as the seed is ripe remove it from the plant and sow thinly in loam based seed compost mixed with equal parts of perlite or sharp sand. Place outside in a cool sheltered spot and don't allow to dry out. Germination can be erratic, but when through, move to a cold frame if you have on When large enough to handle prick out by holding the leaves, not the stem and pot on. When large enough, plant out.

Whatever the weather throws at you this year, enjoy your garden; it's the only one you've got!

In Praise of Long Hair

One of the biggest fears that men have today is the worry of going bald. The first sign of a receding hairline sends men into a panic, of course not for the women. The thing is, read your Bible and all men seem to have long hair. Would I have ever made it into the Rolling Stones in the 60's? O.K., I can't sing or play a guitar but would they have ever considered a premature balding man in his early 20's? So what about poor Elisha on his way to Bethel? "Go on up, you baldhead" some youths shouted at him, "Go on up you baldhead!". (2 Kings 2 v2-3). OK, he then put on a curse in the name of The Lord and 2 bears came out of the woods and mauled 42 of them. You don't jeer Elisha about his hairline! 
Was there anyone in the Old Testament named Jesus? I can't find one, there might have been but one thing, this was the first and only Jesus Christ.



The younger son took his money and went to another country.





1st March: St David's Day, time for daffodils

1st March is St David's Day, and it's time for the Welsh to wear daffodils or leeks. Shakespeare called this custom 'an honourable tradition begun upon an honourable request' – but nobody knows the reason. Why should anyone have ever 'requested' that the Welsh wear leeks or daffodils to honour their patron saint? It's a mystery!

We do know that David – or Dafydd – of Pembrokeshire was a monk and bishop of the 6th century. In the 12th century he was made patron of Wales, and he has the honour of being the only Welsh saint to be canonised and culted in the Western Church. Tradition has it that he was austere with himself, and generous with others – living on water and vegetables (leeks, perhaps?!) and devoting himself to works of mercy. He was much loved.

In art, St David is usually depicted in Episcopal vestments, standing on a mound with a dove at his shoulder, in memory of his share at an important Synod for the Welsh Church, the Synod of Brevi.

17th March: St Patrick, beloved apostle to Ireland

St Patrick is the patron saint of Ireland. If you've ever been in New York on St Patrick's Day, you'd think he was the patron saint of New York as well... the flamboyant parade is full of American/Irish razzmatazz.

It's all a far cry from the hard life of this 5th century humble Christian who became in time both bishop and apostle of Ireland. Patrick was born the son of a town councillor in the west of England, between the Severn and the Clyde. But as a young man he was captured by Irish pirates, kidnapped to Ireland, and reduced to slavery. He was made to tend his master's herds.

Desolate and despairing, Patrick turned to prayer. He found God was there for him, even in such desperate circumstances. He spent much time in prayer, and his faith grew and deepened, in contrast to his earlier years, when he "knew not the true God".

Then, after six gruelling, lonely years he was told in a dream he would soon go to his own country. He either escaped or was freed, made his way to a port 200 miles away and eventually persuaded some sailors to take him with them away from Ireland.

After various adventures in other lands, including near-starvation, Patrick landed on English soil at last, and returned to his family. But he was much changed. He had enjoyed his life of plenty before; now he wanted to devote the rest of his life to Christ. Patrick received some form of training for the priesthood, but not the higher education he really wanted.

But by 435, well-educated or not, Patrick was badly needed. Palladius' mission to the Irish had failed, and so the Pope sent Patrick back to the land of his slavery. He set up his see at Armagh and worked principally in the north. He urged the Irish to greater spirituality, set up a school, and made several missionary journeys.

Patrick's writings are the first literature certainly identified from the British Church. They reveal sincere simplicity and a deep pastoral care. He wanted to abolish paganism, idolatry, and was ready for imprisonment or death in the following of Christ.

Patrick remains the most popular of the Irish saints. The principal cathedral of New York is dedicated to him, as, of course, is the Anglican cathedral of Dublin.

Bob Dylan – 60 years on since his debut album

Sixty years ago, on 19th March 1962, the American folk-rock singer Bob Dylan released his debut album, Bob Dylan. It contained only two original songs, the other 11 being mostly folk covers and partial rewrites, but his huge talent was already apparent. He came from northern Minnesota, but no-one could have guessed where he was going.

Dylan's great inspiration was Woody Guthrie, a folk singer and spokesman for the poor who was dying in the early 60s of Huntington's Chorea. Dylan visited him in hospital, and his first album contained a tribute to him, called 'Song to Woody'.

That album did not make a huge splash, but the follow-up, The Freewheelin' Bob Dylan, released in May 1963 and containing all Dylan's own songs, was a huge success – the first of many. He quickly transformed himself from a first-rank folk singer to a singer-songwriter of huge versatility, outraging many of his original fans by 'going electric' at the Newport Folk Festival two years later.

A motorcycle accident in the mid-60s stopped Dylan in his tracks, and made him rethink the direction he was going – now married and starting a family. But he had a huge following, and everything he produced was snatched up. He combined imaginative, poetic lyrics with attractive melodies, and his singing, though criticised by some, was notable for its innovative but perfect timing, copied by many.

In the late 1970s and early 1980s Dylan shocked his fans by producing three explicitly Christian albums following an experience where, he said, "Jesus put His hand on me". For a while he would play nothing else, but his output became wider again after Infidels (1983). Though he has produced (for him) indifferent albums, he continues – especially in recent years – to come out with breath-taking masterpieces. He is 81 this year.
