Dear Friends,

I always think of this time of year as 'Remembrance' season if there is such a thing.

With 'All Hallows' Eve' on the 31st October, from which Halloween is derived, 'All Hallows Day' (also known as 'All Saints' Day') celebrated on either the 1st November, or the nearest Sunday which this year is the 5th November, depending upon liturgical convenience (our circuit had its annual 'All Saints' Service' at Trinity this year on the evening of Sunday 22nd October, brought forward to avoid half-term week).

This is followed by 'All Souls' Day commemorated on the 2<sup>nd</sup> November, which was originally the day when Roman Catholic and Anglo-Catholic churches commemorate the faithful departed and pray for the souls of those who find themselves in Purgatory.

Then hot on the heels of all of that, comes 'Remembrance Sunday', when we remember those who have given their lives in the service of their country, which this year falls on Sunday 12<sup>th</sup> November, the nearest Sunday to the 11<sup>th</sup>, which is if course the date when the guns of the First World War fell silent and the armistice was signed.

Hopefully you can understand why I call it 'Remembrance' season!

Remembrance is also very much at the heart of and integral to the Christian tradition, as we commit to take the bread and wine offered to us in Jesus' memory.

"Take, eat. This is my body, given for you. Do this in remembrance of me."

"Drink from it, all of you. This is my blood of the new covenant, poured out for all people for the forgiveness of sins. Do this in remembrance of me."

In the liturgy used at Trinity's All Saints' service it says the following:

"In the rising of the sun and in its going down,
In the blowing of the wind and in the chill of winter,
In the blueness of the sky and in the warmth of summer,
In the rustling of leaves and in the beauty of autumn,
In the beginning of the year and when it ends,
When we are lost and sick at heart,
When we have joys we yearn to share,
So long as we live they too shall live for they are part of us."
"For those who lit our lives with joy;
For those who have touched us with tenderness;
For those whose loss fills us with longing;
We give thanks in Glad Remembrance."

Remembering should be important to us all, because when we do so, those people and those things we bring to mind live on.

Therefore at this 'Remembrance' time of year, as the hours of daylight get fewer and the natural world begins to sleep, may our memories keep us going, until we all unite once more.





For the church year to 31<sup>st</sup> August 2024 it is estimated that offertories of £1100 per week will be required to break even.

#### Comments on the Income & Expenses of the Combined General & Roof Funds, y/e 31.8.23

The account shows the day-to-day costs of running Trinity.

The deficit for the year was much less than expected for various reasons, the main ones being:

- Enhanced Gift Aid tax refund from a large Roof Fund loan being converted to a gift, the Gift Aid Small Donation Scheme refund for the previous year received late, in September 2022, Gift Aid on donations exceeded expectations and Gift Aid forecast on offertories was underestimated.
- Interest received from the Methodist Central Finance Board increased substantially due to rising rates.
- Additional room hire groups generated more income than expected.
- A marked increase in donations this year
- A grant of £956 was received from the Wolverhampton & Shrewsbury District towards the cost of double glazed windows for the church flat.

The higher income was partially offset by the following expenses:

- Photocopier usage returned to a normal level
- Electricity costs were in a "catch-up" situation following an underestimate of the monthly direct debit by the supplier.
- There were some unexpected general repairs, namely, a roof leak near the tower, replacement of failed lights in the Sanctuary and a new exterior light near the former bookstore.
- Purchase of new equipment comprising electric cooker & power supply, dishwasher and a mower.
- Double glazed windows for the church flat.

Subsequent to the calculation of the forecast for 2023/24 CMS Garage ceased trading which will reduce Trinity's income by £5k per year and urgent, essential repairs to the block flooring in the hall & corridors will cost £4,500. The cost of necessary tree pollarding is yet to be ascertained.

#### You are the light of the World...

Dear Friends,

I've probably shared these thoughts before but the end of October and beginning of November are my favourite time of the year. You might ask why because the nights are drawing in and the weather is generally getting worse with the onset of winter (although the weather in September and October has been unseasonably good!) Well the reason is simple. I love closing the curtains, putting the fire on and drawing up close to it with a nice warm cup of something! I always feel really snug at this time of year.

But of course there are lots of things that go on at this time of year that we perhaps don't want to endorse like the secular celebration of Halloween. We as Christians should never endorse the celebration of witchcraft or evil but the origins of this festival are more harmless than we often think. The celebration goes back to a time when we didn't have the modern comfort of electric light or a hot water central heating system. People would gather together around a bonfire (good fire) to say together as a community the darkness and the evil associated with the dark would never have control over them. They would carve scary faces in fruit like pumpkins and put candles inside them to scare off the evil spirits and in all this they would welcome the light that would protect them through the long dark winter months.

This is now all lost in the mass commercial market and I don't think we should endorse something that promotes so many misunderstandings. But I was thinking as I thought about the original meaning of the celebration may be we should seek to share what the true light of the world is that surrounds us with love and wants to protect us from all harm.

Of course, we sometimes talk glibly of Jesus as the light of the world but may be its time we should put into practice what we mean by it. We live in dark and disturbing times particularly with all that is going on the world right now. The war in Ukraine and the war and escalating tensions in Israel and Palestine probably make us feel very anxious and uptight right now. We cannot control those things but if we seek to share Jesus' love in words and deeds may be the light we shed may scare some of those anxieties away and people might start to live with hope in their lives.

All this is endorsed by Jesus himself. In the Sermon on the Mount he explains "You are the light of the world...Let your light shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and give glory to God the Father".

May this be true for us and may our light shine out with confidence and with trust during these winter months...








In Flanders fields.


Take up our quarrel with the foe:

Guesting will be Ruth and Ken Powell. Ruth sings with a wonderful voice, backed by Ken's fine musicianship.



#### WEATHER AND GARDENING NOTES FOR NOVEMBER

Season of mists and mellow fruitfulness, Close bosom-friend of the maturing sun; Conspiring with him how to load and bless with fruit the vines that round the thatch-eves run. John Keats (1820)

There are many ideal subjects for producing a spectacular autumn display which are easily grown and widely available here in the UK. Trees for smaller gardens - Amelanchier AGM – orange and red, Cornus kousa var. chinensis AGM – orange and red, Prunus, such as P. sargentii AGM – bright orange and red, Sorbus 'Joseph Rock' – orange, red and purple. Large trees - Cercidiphyllum japonicum AGM – yellow, orange and pink; also curious smell of burnt sugar as leaves break down in autumn, Nyssa sylvatica AGM – brilliant red and yellow, Parrotia persica AGM – yellow, red and purple, Liquidambar styraciflua – brilliant reds and purples, long-lasting autumn colour. Shrubs with exciting autumn tints, Euonymus alatus AGM – rosy-crimson, Acer palmatum 'Osakazuki' AGM – brilliant orange-scarlet, Hamamelis – butter-yellow, Cotinus coggygria AGM – yellow, orange and red Berberis thunbergii AGM – red and orange, Enkianthus campanulatus AGM – bright red, orange and yellow. Vigorous climbers, Parthenocissus tricuspidata AGM – brilliant crimson and purple, Vitis coignetiae AGM – scarlet and crimson.

This 'final' month of autumn can be a busy time...Plant out bare-root or containerised deciduous roses, hedging plants, trees and shrubs, theses can be heeled into the soil for a short period if ground conditions are not suitable for immediate planting, but don't leave them exposed situations or to drying out at any stage. This is also a good time to transplant trees and shrubs growing in unsuitable locations, however if they are more than a couple of years old best leave well.

The pruning and or renovation of many deciduous trees, shrubs and hedges can be carried out from now throughout the dormant season once the sap is down, exceptions are tender plants and also Prunus species (e.g. ornamental cherries, plums and almonds), as these are vulnerable to silver leaf if pruned in the autumn or winter. Evergreens are best left now until the spring. Lightly prune bush roses now, if not done already, reducing their height now will reduce their vulnerability to wind-rock as roses are generally shallow rooted and can become loose in the soil if buffeted by strong winds. Climbing roses should have been pruned now. Shrubs normally pruned hard in the spring - such as Buddleja davidii, Cornus alba and Lavatera - can be cut back by half now also to prevent wind rock and tidy their appearance. Tie wall shrubs and climbers onto their supports to protect them from wind damage with any growth that refuses to be trained in this way pruned away.

November is the optimum month to plant out tulip bulbs and to cut down or divide faded herbaceous perennials, although penstemons are best left unpruned until spring. Ornamental grasses / bamboos can be cut back now, lift and store dahlias, cannas and tuberous bedding begonias once hit by the first frosts. As a precaution raise patio containers onto feet or bricks to avoid them from sitting in the 'winter puddles'. Remove any stakes and other supports from late-flowering herbaceous plants as they die down for the winter. Tidy up leaves from around the borders, either adding these to the compost heap or even placed into punctured bin bags to breakdown over winter into leafmould. Dig over beds as the weather allows but don't work on them when it's very wet or heavy clay, as walking on sodden soil without a foot plank or board can cause compaction. Hoe borders regularly to keep weeds in check, digging up perennial weeds with long tap roots.

Enjoy your garden; it is the only one you've got!


"They shall grow not old as we that are left grow old.

#### A new kind of Remembrance poppy

For the first time in 28 years, there is a new kind of poppy for Remembrance Sunday this year: it is plastic free.

Director of the Poppy Appeal, Andy Taylor-Whyte explains: "We are very proud to introduce the plastic-free poppy. It will not only enable people to support our Armed Forces community but also continues the RBL's commitment to sustainability."

The new poppy has been three years in the development and making. The aim was to reduce the use of single-use plastic and to "be economical, sustainable, and less impactful to the environment."

The new poppy design has a 40% smaller carbon footprint, and it made from "bespoke red and green paper." The paper comes from a blend of renewable fibres, 50 per cent of which has been recovered from the waste used in the production of coffee cups.

The plastic-free poppy will be available alongside remaining stocks of the current poppy, to reduce any waste of poppies already produced. Poppies containing single-use plastic can be returned to Sainsbury's stores for recycling.

#### The poppies of Remembrance Sunday

In late 1914, WW1 erupted across Northern France and Flanders. Great swathes of previously green fields and forests were blasted and bombed, leaving them bleak and barren, with seemingly every living thing destroyed.

But then in the Spring of 1915, something beautiful began to come out of all the destruction. Tens of thousands of bright red Flanders poppies began to put out tentative shoots across the endless vistas of mud. These resilient little flowers had actually flourished in the middle of so much chaos and destruction, because their seeds grow when exposed to sunlight, through disturbances to soil.

We all know that these endless fields of cheerful poppies, growing in the midst of such misery and destruction, were what inspired the Canadian doctor, Lieutenant Colonel John McCrae, to write the now famous poem 'In Flanders Fields'.

And it was McCrae's poem which inspired an American academic named Moina Michael to adopt the poppy in memory of those who had fallen in the war. She got it adopted as an official symbol of Remembrance across the United States, and worked with others who were trying to do the same in Canada, Australia, and the UK.

A French woman, Anna Guérin who was in the UK in 1921, caught the same vision, and planned to sell the poppies in London. There she met Earl Haig, the founder of the Royal British Legion, who was persuaded to adopt the poppy as its emblem in the UK.

The Royal British Legion, which had been formed in 1921, ordered nine million poppies and sold them on 11 November that year. Ever since then, the red poppy has been a symbol of Remembrance, of support for the Armed Forces community, and also of hope for a peaceful future.

Also 60 years ago, on 23<sup>rd</sup> Nov 1963 that the first episode of the science fiction television series Doctor Who was broadcast in the UK. It is the longest-running and most successful science fiction TV series in the world.

50 years ago, on 13<sup>th</sup> Nov 1973 that Britain declared a state of emergency as a strike by coal miners caused supplies to dwindle. A 3-Day Week was introduced to conserve supplies.

40 years ago, on 14<sup>th</sup> Nov 1983 that British Defence Secretary Michael Heseltine announced that the first American Cruise missiles had arrived at Greenham Common airbase.

30 years ago, on 1<sup>st</sup> Nov 1993 that the Maastricht Treaty came into effect, establishing the European Union. (EU).

20 years ago, on 22<sup>nd</sup> Nov 2003 that England won the Rugby World Cup for the first time.

15 years ago, on  $14^{th} - 15^{th}$  Nov 2008 that the first G20 Summit was held in Washington DC. It was established as a result of the 2008 financial crisis.

#### Remembering the National Service - 60 years on

This year marks 60 years since the end of National Service. The Royal British Legion and the nation will be celebrating all that a generation of young men did for this country during those years, when conscription became just a part of growing up.

National Service drew in a staggering number of young men – more than two million of them were conscripted between the end of the Second World War and May 1963, when the last serviceman was demobbed.

Conscription had come about following the war, when there was a huge demand for military resources in Britain. Young service men were badly needed to retain the Empire, and to contribute to the occupation of Germany and Japan. Yet low birth rates in Britain in the 1930s meant there were fewer young men available for military service.

And so the 1947 National Service Act was brought in as a solution. It meant that young men aged 18 – 26 were required to serve in the Armed Forces for 18 months. They were sent to posts in the UK and to British garrisons around the world. Some fought on the front lines, and some worked as clerks. Some taught in the Education Corps, and some were on sentry duty.

For many of them, it would have been the first time they lived away from their family, let alone left the country. So the National Service made great demands on them – and left them with a wide range of experiences.

#### Happy Birthday, King Charles!

King Charles was born 75 years ago this month, on 14<sup>th</sup> November 1948, at Buckingham Palace in London. He was the longest-serving monarch-in-waiting in British history and did not ascend the throne until he was 73, following the death of his mother in September 2022.

Charles was crowned in the first coronation in seven decades, on 6<sup>th</sup> May 2023. His current title is King of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland.

But King Charles has also become head of the Commonwealth, an association of 56 independent countries and 2.5 billion people. For 14 of these countries, as well as the UK, the King is head of state. These countries are known as the Commonwealth realms. They are Australia, Antigua and Barbuda, the Bahamas, Belize, Canada, Grenada, Jamaica, New Zealand, Papua New Guinea, St Christopher and Nevis, St Lucia, St Vincent and the Grenadines, Solomon Islands, and Tuvalu.

#### Sniffing out a wildfire

Have you ever been at home, and suddenly smelled something burning in the house? Most of us react to it immediately – fires spread quickly!

Well, now the National Trust has installed 'electronic noses' on a Yorkshire Moor to 'sniff' out wildfires. The electronic sensors will detect changes in the air at the very start of a wildfire, and immediately report its presence and exact location via a wireless network. This could prevent the wildfire spreading and causing havoc.

Currently most wildfires are only detected when people see flames and smell smoke – but by then the fire will have really taken hold – especially if it is in an obscure location.

Marsden Moor has been given the new sensors because there have been seven fires there already – this year alone. The fires have destroyed nearly two square miles of the moorland, which is a Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI) and is home to rare plants, wildlife, and carbon-rich peat.

This is the first time that detection devices have been used in Britain. If the scheme works, are electronic sensors the way forward for other conservation areas?






