From the Editor



In seconds there were about thirty to forty ducks flying in, and charging through the water to grab the pieces of bread. I noticed that three or four male ducks fought off the others and grabbed a large share. They were quite determined to have their share and more than their fair share. There was a great noise of angry quacking and splashing before the bread was all gone. A few days ago I cleaned out the bird feeders, put them out and filled them. Once again the aggressive sparrows tried to drive away the blue tits and great tits. I put some seed on the ground for the blackbirds, but they seemed to spend their energy chasing off other blackbirds and not eating the food. Robins will often fight their own reflection in a mirror. Tennyson wrote the line 'nature, red in tooth and claw'. We talk about the peace and tranquillity of the countryside, but for most of the time it is an unseen battlefield.

If you wonder why there so many ducks on the river here, there are around three hundred in this immediate section of the river. They have been bought specially for duck shooting. The shooters line up, the ducks are flushed out, and the shooters let fly - they can hardly miss. We really are no better that the birds and animals.

I washed a duvet cover and hung it on the washing line to dry in the sun. It dried well, but when I went to get it in I saw that a bird had perched on the line and left a lovely deposit on the duvet cover, so it had to be washed again.

I do love birds....most of the time..... I think.

The Last Farewell

One thing I would hate to do while writing something in Trinity Tidings is to cause controversy, but I think I'm justified here. John Wesley's last letter, written on his death bed was to William Wilberforce. It shows Wesley's sympathy with the wrongs of the slave trade and his interest in Wilberforce's mission in life. From his time in America he had become familiar with the horrors of the slave trade. Wilberforce was well known to both him and his brother, Charles. He wrote, and I quote ...

"Unless God has raised you up for this very thing, you will be worn out by the opposition of men and devils; but if God be for you, who can be against you? Oh, be not weary in well doing, go on, in the name of God and in the power of His might, till even American slavery, the vilest that ever saw the sun, shall vanish away before it. I was particularly struck by the circumstance that a man saw the sun, shall vanish away before it. I was particularly struck by the circumstance that a man who has a black skin, being wronged or outraged by a white man, can have no redress. What villainy is this! That he who has guided you from your youth up may continue to strengthen you in this and all things is the prayer of, dear Sir, your affectionate servant, John Wesley"

Nobody could wish a more beautiful close to Wesley's writings – This letter is a prophetic epitome to the history of emancipation.

This letter was written on February 24th 1791. Wesley was to die on March 2nd 1791. His last words were "Lord, thou givest strength to those that can speak and to those that cannot. Speak Lord, to all our hearts and let them know that thou loosest the tongue. Let us all go, the best of all is, God is with us".

They are pulling statues down because of connections to slavery. Shouldn't they be erecting them in memory of John Wesley?

GARDENING NOTES FOR OCTOBER

October is usually the month when we experience our first taste of real autumn; the result of an increased temperature gradient between the relative warm ocean of the sub-tripical and North Atlantic, and the rapidly cooling Arctic. Atlantic depressions and low-pressure systems are generally more active than September's offerings, the effect of stronger wind and rain much appreciated on exposed hills and sites across all areas of the uk.

October is definitely an autumnal month, usually a good mixture of wet and windy conditions with some fine, settled weather thrown in for good measure too. The aforementioned increased temperature gradient results in a tendency for well-defined frontal boundaries, with often pronounced temperature changes, as an active system transits the country.

Tropical air will generally be moist, damp and heavily laden with cloud, the sun much weaker now and unable to burn off these layers, leaving typical cloudy, drizzly and dull conditions after heavy, prolonged rainfall ahead of a warm front.

Polar air, now inherently much cooler, is very unstable and prone to heavy showers, often blustery and thundery in nature. A blast from the north will bring the first hail, sleet and snow to upland areas. Rising pressure and light winds also bring the threat of mist, fog and low overnight temperatures.

You could be forgiven for thinking that October is a real gloomy month, but far from it, as it is during this month that the countryside is often at its 'autumnal best', ablaze with hues of gold, yellow and red, especially after the first frosts and a dry autumn. Get out and enjoy the spectacle!

With Autumn upon us there will be a good deal of debris about, so don't leave it hanging around; if it's useable, compost it, if it's diseased, burn it.

Perennials will be dying back now, especially so after the first frosts. Stems and foliage will be yellowing or browning and will require cutting back. Most herbaceous perennials can be cut back to ground level, the foliage either composted or, if diseased, burnt.

Make up winter display containers now, before the worst of the weather is upon us. A mix of evergreen plants such as euonymus, ivies and skimmia surrounded by winter bedding and bulbs will, with careful choice, bring a welcome succession of colour throughout the autumn and on into next spring. Raise containers on clay feet or wood supports to aid free drainage by ensuring drainage holes aren't blocked by debris. Don't over-water winter containers, but do check weekly that they don't dry out. Water as required but, at all costs, avoid winter wet.

Summer subjects that have performed well, such as dahlias, will require lifting and protection over the winter period. Dahlias are best lifted once the first frosts of autumn have blackened the foliage. Gently prize the plant out of the soil using a spade, taking great care not to slice through the tubers whilst you're doing it! Once out of the ground, remove the spent flower stems leaving about a 1-inch (25mm) stump. Any thin roots may be trimmed away. Gently split the upper section of the stem with a sharp knife to allow excess water to drain away. If necessary, place the tubers, hanging upside down, in a cool, dry, frost-free place for a couple of weeks. To over-winter, dust lightly with sulphur powder and bury the tubers in boxes of dry sand, soil or compost, leaving only exposed stems. A position that is cool and frost-free should be found; check regularly for rot, which should be cut out on discovery with a sharp knife, the wound dusted with sulphur.

Any remaining spring bulb planting schemes should be completed this month, although the planting of tulips should be delayed until November. Grease bands can be put on fruit trees as protection against female winter months.

If you want hyacinths in flower for Christmas you have probably missed the boat, as prepared bulbs need a good 12-week period for success; although it still isn't too late to plant hyacinths for New Year planting schemes. Use bulb fibre that has been pre-moistened, placing a layer in the base of the bowl or pot. Place the bulbs on the compost, setting close together varieties of only the same kind; mixing varieties usually brings disappointing, uneven results. Bulbs should not touch each other or the sides of the container. Fill around the bulbs with compost, filling to just below the rim of the container; the bulb tops should still be showing above the compost. Place the container in a cool, dark place - a temperature of no higher than 9 C (48 F) is required - Checking regularly for drying out. When shoots have developed to a length of about 2" (50mm) the bulbs can be brought into a light environment, but <u>not</u> a sunny windowsill, to allow the growth to green up. Move gradually to a warmer and brighter position and enjoy the colour and fragrance that follows.

Dig over exposed or recently cultivated areas to allow impending frost action to do its work. This also brings bugs, grubs and larvae to the surface; a good source of food for birds.

If you are thinking of moving deciduous plants then do it now through to mid-March, evergreens only now <u>or</u> late March, the soil is still quite warm and the roots will quickly reestablish. Lift plants with as much of the root ball intact as possible. Don't cramp the plant into its new position; ensure that the new planting position is adequately deep and wide, and work soil between the roots, firming-in well. Water thoroughly and stake if necessary. Keep well watered throughout the coming season.

There is a lot to do during the autumn; let's hope that the weather is kind enough to let us do what needs to be done. If the conditions are favourable then make the best of the available time.

Zebra crossings - saving lives for 70 years by Tim Lenton

Seventy years ago, on 31st October 1951, zebra crossings were introduced officially in the UK. The first one was in Slough, Berkshire.

The crossings had been trialled over two years at 1000 experimental sites, but in 1951 the black and white striped pedestrian crossings were approved, with their flashing Belisha beacons, and all drivers were required by law to stop as soon as a pedestrian set foot on them.

The crossings were the brainchild of Yorkshireman and traffic engineer George 'Dr Zebra' Charlesworth, a physicist who had worked on the Barnes Wallis-designed bouncing bomb during the war. His zebra crossings were certainly responsible for saving many lives.

The Belisha beacons, an integral part of the crossing but used since 1934, were introduced by Leslie Hore-Belisha, who served as Minister of Transport at the time.

Zebra crossings were adopted throughout the world, from continental Europe to North America, Singapore and Australia. They have now been superseded to some extent in the UK by pelican crossings, which are controlled by lights. These were introduced in 1969. While zebras were named because of their appearance, a pelican crossing (originally pelicon) is so named as a contraction of the phrase 'pedestrian light controlled'. Parish Pump 2021

All in the month of OCTOBER

It was:

500 years ago, on 11th Oct 1521 that Pope Leo X granted the title 'Defender of the Faith' to King Henry VIII of England and Ireland. It recognised the King's defence of the sacrament of marriage, the supremacy of the Pope, and his opposition to the Protestant Reformation and the ideas of Martin Luther. The title has been inherited by British monarchs since then.

250 years ago, on 17th Oct 1771 that the premiere of Mozart's pastoral opera, Ascanio in Alba, took place in Milan, Italy. Mozart was then aged 15.

150 years ago, from 8th to 10th Oct 1871, that the Great Chicago Fire took place. A fire in a barn quickly spread, following a long period of hot, dry weather. About 300 people were killed, over three square miles of the city was destroyed, and around 100,000 people made homeless. Also at this time was the Peshtigo Fire of Wisconsin – it burned 1,200,000 acres and killed up to 2,500 people – the deadliest wildfire in US history.

125 years ago, on 3rd Oct 1896 that William Morris, British textile designer, pot novelist and socialist, died. Best known for his association with the Arts and Crafts Movement.

70 years ago, from 15th to 17th Oct 1951 that the first party election broadcasts were televised in the UK. The three main parties, Liberal, Conservative and Labour, were allocated 15 minutes each. Also 70 years ago, on 18th Oct 1951that Snowdonia National Park was established in Wales.

65 years ago, from 29th Oct to 7th Nov 1956 that the Suez Crisis took place. Israel invaded Egypt in an attempt to regain Western control of the Suez Canal and remove President Gamal Abdel Nasser from power. Britain and France joined the invasion but were forced to withdraw by the United Nations, the USA and the USSR. British Prime Minister Anthony Eden resigned in Jan 1957 and Sinai was occupied by Israel until March 1957.

60 years ago, on 6th Oct 1961 that US President John F Kennedy advised Americans to build bomb shelters to protect themselves from nuclear fallout in the event of an attack by the Soviet Union.

50 years ago, on 1st Oct 1971 that the first CT scan was performed on a patient at Atkinson Morley Hospital in Wimbledon.

40 years ago, on 3rd Oct 1981 that a hunger strike by IRA members in Maze Prison, County Down, ended after seven months. 10 prisoners had died.

25 years ago, on 18th Oct 1996 that the journal Science published the first study that showed a causal link between a toxin found in tobacco smoke and the development of lung cancer.

Bible Sunday – 24th October

This special Sunday in the church's calendar is an opportunity to stop and consider the enormous blessing that the Bible has brought to people down the centuries. Without it, we would know nothing about God our Father, Jesus Christ, or the Holy Spirit. It is God-breathed – full of His love and guidance to us. World history would have been radically different without it.

How should we read the Bible?

There are three things to bear in mind when you pick up your Bible:

First, approach it expectantly. The Bible is not just another book – it is the Word of God, given to us by God to help us and instruct us. The Psalmist declared, 'Your Word is a lamp to my feet and a light for my path' (Psalm 119:105). Therefore, as you open your Bible, pray that the Holy Spirit (who inspired the writers of the Bible) will illumine its meaning to you. Read it carefully, not just hurrying through it as you would a novel.

Secondly, read your Bible systematically. Aim to read about three chapters a day: begin at Genesis and work through the Old Testament. Begin in Matthew and work through the New Testament; begin in Psalms and work through Psalms and Proverbs. Simply continue these three cycles, and it will ensure that your diet of Bible reading each day will be varied and include a bit of everything!

Finally, read your Bible obediently. Be ready to obey the truth that God has for you in its pages. God gave the Bible to us 'for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness' (2 Timothy 3:16), and the Bible can change our lives as we read it and obey its teachings every day.

Dracula isn't here!

A church in North Yorkshire has been trying to convince eager tourists that the vampire's grave is NOT in their churchyard.

Edith Cavell, nurse

Edith Cavell is a good saint for NHS workers this year: she cared for the sick despite the danger to her own safety.

Edith was a vicar's daughter from Swardeston in Norfolk, where she was born in 1865. She became a governess, but her heart was for nursing, so she went on to train at the London Hospital, before nursing in various hospitals such as St Pancras and Manchester.

When Edith was 42, she decided to go abroad, and was appointed matron of a large training centre for nurses in Brussels. She was still there seven years later, when the First World War broke out and German troops invaded Belgium on their way to Paris and the Channel Ports.

Edith's nursing school became a Red Cross hospital, and she turned down the opportunity to return to the safety of England. Instead, her nurses tended wounded soldiers from both German and Allied armies. Sadly, in 1915, when the Germans began their occupation of Brussels, they took a dim view of Edith's work. But they would have been even more unhappy had they known she was helping to smuggle 200 British soldiers across the border into the Netherlands!

Finally, the Germans arrested Edith in August 1915, and put her into solitary confinement. They tricked her into confessing to a charge which carried the death penalty. But Edith refused to show either regret at what she had done, or any fear or bitterness towards her captors.

On 11th October 1915, the night before her execution, Edith was visited by the Anglican chaplain to Brussels, the Revd Stirling Gahan. Together they said the words of *Abide with Me*, and Edith received her last Holy Communion. She told Gahan: "I am thankful to have had these ten weeks of quiet to get ready. Now I have had them and have been kindly treated here. I expected my sentence and I believe it was just. Standing, as I do, in view of God and eternity, I realise that patriotism is not enough. I must have no hatred or bitterness to anyone."

Edith was shot by a firing squad next day, on 12th October 1915. After the war her body was exhumed and buried in Norwich Cathedral. Her memorial service in Westminster Abbey attracted thousands. A commemorative statue of her stands near Trafalgar Square.


